# 5. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Public Participation

Susan Roth: read a prepared statement on behalf of the FIRST Student transportation workers; told the Board in part, that they have the power with one vote to impact and negatively change the lives of 65 dedicated men and women who dive the district's children to school, and service the vehicles that transport them...; mentioned a statement made by Michael Buzzeo at the pre-bid conference, re: the contract being awarded to the lowest, most responsible bidder and the district expecting a high level of service; said First Student as the incumbent, has provided the district with both; mentioned a First student counteroffer of four one-year extensions with a cap of 3% or CPI, whichever is less; with savings to the district...; asked that the Board save the jobs of the men and women who has served this district with safe and reliable transportation for so many year.

*Toni Huffine*: asks that a vote is not taken on the transportation contract until the Board has had a chance to get all the facts; said on Friday Mr. Moodt announced at the "chicken place" that Montauk Bus will be honored the transportation contract – also said she received several calls pertaining to this issue; and that the Board has already made up its mind; spoke of the drivers' personal hardships.

Selene Bourque: said she has lived in the district for 28 years; and is in support of the drivers of FIRST Student; also said that she received an email message from Mr. Moodt in error and that the "the message suggested the Board wants FIRST Student out"; also spoke of the reluctance of the business office to surrender the bid specs.

John Stevens: said he has been with FIRST Student for 1.5 years and has never been in this situation; and it had been rumored long before this occurrence that FIRST Student was getting the ax; also says he would be willing to "give up" his job for another diver; spoke of "discrepancies" in statements from members of the Board re "the numbers" and that considering the circumstances, it appear members of the Board show no empathy toward the emotional state of the drivers.

Bob Mendez: said he is a resident and tax-payer, and has children who use FIRST Student buses; urges the Board to "find a reason to retain the contract with FIRST Student in order to avoid loss of jobs."

Tom McEnany: - [Area Regional Manager, FIRST Student Transportation Co.]: spoke of the economic situation and an alternative offer to the district that was below the lowest bidder by \$10 thousand; said Board members should listen to the community and drivers, and that "it doesn't make sense to offer the contract to another when First Student has an offer on the table"; also spoke of the faithfulness and reliability of the First Student drivers.

Pat Callahan [bus matron] said Laidlaw/First Student has the best drivers; and that their drivers are caring and compassionate toward the children

Allison Stines: [parent] – spoke of having drivers that the community knows; said the board knows nothing of the background of the drivers from the other bus company

Ann Marie Rizzo: [single parent and bus driver for 22 years] – said she is self-supporting; and that FIRST Student gives safety courses and therefore has the best drivers.

# 6. PRESENTATION

Presentation

Interim Assistant Superintendent for Business & Finance Michael Buzzeo, reported to the Board of Education, on the **results of the transportation bid** held on February 27, 2009. He stated that in the fall of last year, the charge of the Superintendent was to come up with a plan, over a 3-year to 5-year period, that would stabilize the tax rate, lower costs, while preserving quality. A bidding process with carefully crafted specification was therefore initiated that would generate competition. Mr. Buzzeo said that during the pre-bid process, all question from potential bidders were responded to, with responses sent to all; adding that the process was "pristine" and that the district's purpose was achieved.

#### Q & A:

Toni Huffine: Q re: who communicated with the contractors?

*Michael Buzzeo*: said, "with absolute certainty", he was the only person running the bidding process, and that he had no contact with members of the Board; also said the process was "absolutely pristine and fair".

*Marian McKenna*: asked for timeline clarification on First Student's submission of its contract extension?

*Michael Buzzeo*: said this occurred after the bidding process; and that First Student asked that the bids are rejected and said they would be willing to beat Montauk's numbers by \$10 thousand per year.

School Attorney Ray Keenan: On preserving the integrity of the bid process: said rejection of all bids will counter what a bid process is about – it seeks to foster honest competition to bidders; the consequences for rejecting this bid from responsible bidders, is to discourage other vendors from participating in the competitive bidding process in the future; as a result, few, if any bidders would participate in the process which could be seen as corruptive and showing favoritism; thereby reducing necessary competition in the future. Mr. Keenan continued by saying that the Board has no rationale for rejecting the bids from the two bidders who are responsible, with the lowest bid complying to specifications that would result in significant savings to the district without damaging the bidding process.; and thereby recommended that the Board not reject these bids, rather award the contract based upon the specification that was presented.

Carl Moodt [echoed by Victor Correa]: In the form of a question and statement: If the district continued with the current vendor/contract, we will be paying 5% more than we're paying this year; now, as a result of the bidding process, everyone "came down on their prices"; Q to the attorney re: his statement referencing discouragement of bidders if the current bids were rejected?

*Toni Huffine*: Q re: whether the Board has an option on its choice – First Student or Montauk Busing – although First Student's bid numbers are higher? And Q re: the definition of "Responsible"?

School Attorney Ray Keenan: Responsible, by law is that there are no performance problems documented for which the Board is aware – more of a minimum standard, not a comparison.

Presentation's Q & A [Cont"d]

*Toni Huffine*: spoke of a bankruptcy record involving Montauk Bus...? *Michael Buzzeo*: said he looked at the financial record of all the potential vendors; and that bankruptcy (Chapter 11) filing was a result of a labor issue; and the company operating today is not the same company who filed Chapter 11 – similar to Laidlaw and First Student; also said the Board was given extensive background information on all bidders.

*Toni Huffine*: asked for clarification on Laidlaw's filing of bankruptcy? Q re: whether First Student and Laidlaw were separate companies?

*Tom McEnany*: One of Laidlaw's company filed Chapter 11 Reorganization. That reorganization was acknowledged and put through the process. Laidlaw came out of the reorganization stronger in the marketplace than ever before. First Student purchased Laidlaw because of their performance/balance sheets

*Marian McKenna*: Q: at what point did First Student bring forth the 4-year over the 1-year that was presented?

Response – Michael Buzzeo: About one week after the bid results were read. Marian McKenna: asked Tom McEneny why First Student did not submit that offer before the bids were opened? Said she is angry about the position in which First Student has put the Board because their best offer was not given; and now the future integrity of district is in jeopardy if the biding process were to be corrupted; spoke of an increase of up to triple what other districts are paying for busing, and that none of this money was given to the drivers; informed all those in attendance that the Board is not the one who has put the First Student's drivers in this position. Gregory Miglino: said revenues have increased by 229% last year, our operating profit increased by 384%; and that drivers were asked whether their salaries increased by that amount; said the legal process was used to put out a competitive bid and at the end of the day, this seemed to be a non-corruptive process. Mr. Miglino added that although the action of the Board this evening could cost some drivers to lose their jobs, the Board is hopeful that the drivers will be employed in a couple of days.

*Toni Huffine*: Q to Gregory Miglino re: whether he engaged in conversations with Mr. Mensch (Montauk Bus] – having conversations that gave him [Mr. Mensch] financial information above everyone else?

*Gregory Miglino*: said yesterday was the first time he had spoken with Mr. Mensch, but that he had met with Tom last year, as authorized by the Board, to renegotiate a 1-year deal.

*Toni Huffine*: spoke about a conversation Gregory Miglino had with a bus driver concerning the distribution of flyers; said Mr. Miglino was yelling and waving his hands at the driver.

*Gregory Miglino*: asked the driver to stand and tell whether he was shouting at her. *Response from Driver*: No.

#### STATEMENT: Board President

Board President Gregory Miglino: "Like all of the Municipal Agencies on Long Island, South Country School District has been forced to look at expenses and where possible, reduce cost in areas that least impact education. In this case, the district has used a competitive bidding process established by law, to help us realize the tremendous savings to our community while maintaining a level of service. We

Board President's Statement understand and appreciate the actions of our drivers and other employees of First student, to the extent we can minimize that impact, we can do so. We must balance that with our fiduciary responsibility to both our community and staff."
